Chapter One

The Spirit of Venom

The word venom, in its simplest explanation, means poison. Often times, the two words are used interchangeably. Venom has two definitions; one of which expresses the natural science of what venom really is and another to express a more psychological state of being that is used.

Definition:

VENOM: 1) A poisonous substance secreted by animals such as snakes, spiders, and scorpions and typically injected into prey or aggressors by biting or stinging.

 Extreme malice and bitterness shown in someone's attitude, speech, or actions.

The spirit of venom is a psychological state of using past hurt and pain as a catalyst of venom.

It is also a defense mechanism that people use every time they notice something familiar coming along. People will often "throw up a wall of venom," as a means of protecting themselves. Venom is also the backlash that someone might receive, as a result of someone else's actions. You see, venom is a major form

of defense, almost like putting a wall up. Most people that have any type of venom, also have been used or mistrusted by someone else in the past. You see this often in the case of someone that may get into a relationship with someone new, but holds onto the offenses of the last person.

When the Word of God speaks of poison or venom, it uses both definitions in correlation with each other. The insects mentioned in scripture are used, as metaphors, to depict the behavior of humans and the wicked one, not the righteous.

Such is the case with Psalm 58:1-4:

Psalm 58:1-4 NASB

"Do you indeed speak righteousness, O gods? Do you judge uprightly, O sons of men?² No, in heart you work unrighteousness; on earth you weigh out the violence of your hands. ³ The wicked are estranged from the womb; these who speak lies go astray from birth. ⁴ They have venom like the venom of a serpent; like a deaf cobra that stops up its ear,"

Psalm 140:3 Parallel

"They make their tongues as sharp as a snake's bite; viper's venom is under their lips. Selah"

Romans 3:13 Parallel

"¹³Their throat is an open grave; they deceive with their tongues. Vipers' venom is under their lips."

Venom or poison is lodged inside of insects such as spiders, bees, snakes, and scorpions. Their venom is used as a defense mechanism for the prey and predators. In the expression of psychological thoughts, venom is used by humans against the character of another person and even used to demean, undermine and dethrone or remove from a place of authority and influence in the minds of people. Some are blissfully unaware of the negative impact that they have on those around them and others seem to derive satisfaction from creating chaos and pushing people's buttons. Either way, they create unnecessary complexity, strife and worst of all, stress.
